Brooklyn Center Welcomes New Mayor and City Council Members

At the **Monday, January 9, 2023,** City Council meeting, in front of family, friends, residents, and colleagues, the City of Brooklyn Center held swearing-in ceremonies for Mayor Graves, Councilmember Jerzak, and Councilmember Kragness.

Mayor Graves was the first woman of color on the Brooklyn Center city council when she was first elected in 2014. In November 2022, she was elected the first woman of color Mayor of the City of Brooklyn Center.

Councilmember Dan Jerzak before being elected to the City Council has worked for the City of Brooklyn Center since 2006 in many different capacities.

Councilmember Teneshia Kragness before being elected to the City Council has served on the Brooklyn Center Financial Commission since 2010. Councilmember Kragness is the granddaughter of former Mayor Myrna Kragness.

The Mayor and two new council members who have a wealth of experience and knowledge have been busy growing in their new positions and making Brooklyn Center the best it can be.



City News

2023 Utility Rates

On **January 9, 2023**, the council approved the 2023 utility rates. Below is a chart comparing the 2023 rates to the previous 2022 rates there is a \$9.66 base rate increase.

2023 Budget

On **December 5, 2022**, the City Council approved the 2023 Budget. The total city levy was \$22,795,382 which is a 6.9% levy increase from 2022.

Note: A property tax levy increase/decrease of 1% is approximately \$200,000 in revenue.





Fiscal & Support Services

The Fiscal and Support Services Department (more commonly referred to as the Finance Department) administers the City of Brooklyn Center's finance activities, including the coordination and planning of all City financial information.

This Department provides cost-effective services to the City Council, City Departments, and other governmental units. Finance Department staff combine their broad range of professional skills with existing and new software and hardware technologies to provide continued support to both internal and external customers. The Finance team is thankful for the support we receive from the City Council, City Manager, and all City Departments.

Core Accounting Functions

Financial Reporting: Finance staff provides monthly General Fund financial statements and an Investment activity report to the City Council. The Finance Department is also responsible for reporting financial information to numerous outside agencies throughout the year, including but not limited to Federal, state, county, and other jurisdictions.

Utility Billing: The utility billing process includes the calculation of water and sewer charges as well as the management of quarterly billing statements and payment receipts. Staff prepares and sends out approximately 9,000 per billing cycle.

Insurance: Finance staff manages insurance activity (other than health and dental insurance) for the City. This includes property/motor vehicle insurance, liability insurance, and workers' compensation insurance. Finance staff works with the City's insurance representatives to determine rates and submit and resolve claims.

Grant Activity: Finance staff monitors the financial activity of Grants received by the City. This includes tracking and reporting on revenues and expenses. Grants can be received from local entities, or the county, state, and Federal government.

Annual Budget And Levy: Finance staff spends considerable time preparing the annual budget and working with the City Manager to minimize the annual tax levy. In 2023, staff recommended a property tax levy increase of 6.9%. This increase was accepted by the City Council.



Senior Sewer Rate

Did you know that the city offers a Senior Sanitary Sewer Rate? The discount rate is for residents 62 years of age or older and a maximum of two people in the household. To apply for the reduced sewer rate by completing the application on the website (ci.brooklyn-center.mn.us) and search Senior Sewer Rate then return it to the city.

Commission Openings



Housing Commission

The Housing Commission is seeking members of the community to serve on the commission. The activity of this commission is to advise the City Council and other Brooklyn Center advisory commissions regarding matters relevant to housing. The general purpose of the commission is to afford citizen input in the development of a housing program to supplement the activities of the City Council. Commissioners serve a three-year term. To qualify for membership, you must be a Brooklyn Center resident while serving on the commission and represent a broad range of interest in the housing function. The housing commission meets at city hall on the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 7 pm.



Charter Commission

The Charter Commission is seeking members of the community to serve on the commission. The commission reviews the existing charter, considers proposed changes and makes recommendations to the City Council, and safeguards the concept of Home Rule under the existing charter and Home Rule provisions in the state statutes. The commission meets quarterly; commissioners serve a four-year term and may serve unlimited successive terms.

The applicant must be a qualified voter in Brooklyn Center. Interested individuals can call City Clerk Barb Suciu at 763-569-3306 for information or visit the city's website at ci.brooklyncenter.mn.us. The chief judge of fourth judicial district court will make the final appointments.



The City is establishing a Cultural Arts Commission to guide further planning on the public art master plan and collaborate with the City on investments, opportunities, and projects as it relates to art in the Brooklyn Center community.

Sister Cities Commission

In 2012, the city of Voinjama, Liberia was formally established by City Council as Sister City to the City of Brooklyn Center. the Sister Cities Commission serves as an advisory body on matters affecting sister cities relationships, programs, and activities. This Sister Cities Commission will review applications for sister city affiliations and forward recommendations to the City Council for the establishment of future Sister City agreements. Commissioners are expected to volunteer time to participate in Sister City event projects outside the regular meetings. Commissioners serve a five-year term. The Commission is composed of a chairperson and four members. Sister Cities Commission is recruiting new members.

Effective **February 19, 2022,** Special Event organizers must obtain a Special Event Permit from the city at least 45 days before their planned event.

Event organizers can obtain a permit from the City of Brooklyn Center's Clerk's office. The permit application will address information about the event and also what, if any city services are needed or requested for the event.

What is a Special Event? It is a temporary, organized activity sponsored by an event organizer involving the gathering of people to attend, participate in, or observe an activity occurring entirely or partly outside on city property or private property.

The permit applies to the following cases:

- Support services from the city;
- Obstruct, delay, or interfere with the free and normal use of a right-of-way;
- Attendance of 50 or more people;
- Ancillary activities; or
- Use of sound amplification, public address system, loudspeaker, and or other audio devices likely to result in noise levels that will unreasonably disturb others in the immediate area or that constitutes a nuisance violation of Chapter 19.

Recurring Event? Special events that are recurring, such as a farmer's market, will only need to obtain a single permit annually for all of the scheduled events.

Permit Exception. Events intended to allow for the expression of free speech, which does not impede roadways and are on public property do not require a permit.



Emerging BC traveled to Oakland and San Francisco CA, February 7 – 10 for its second Learning Journey

Ahimsa Collective

The Ahimsa Collective works to address harm in ways that foster wholeness for everyone. Their north star goals are to replace systems of punishment with paradigms grounded in healing, relationship, and love. To get there, they engage with deep trauma healing and restorative approaches while being grounded in anti-oppression. They work in deep communities with people who have committed an act of violence, survivors of violence, and families impacted by harm. In all of their work, they center on agency, liberation, dignity, and transformation. Their work intersects with restorative justice, transformative justice, healing justice, and ending sexual violence movements.

Black Panther Legacy Tour

Honoring the original Black Panther Party, discover a deeply unique, educational experience in the birthplace of the Black Panther Party: Oakland, California. The official BPP Alumni Legacy Tour features a tour with Dr. Saturu Ned, an original Black Panther Party member providing direct access and true stories of the Panthers in the historical locations in Downtown Oakland. This tour will dismisses all of the historical fallacies & falsehoods about what the Black Panther Party was all about and gives you a personal glimpse into what really happened by the revolutionaries who were there.

Chinese Cultural Center

CCC's policies are driven by our deep commitment to racial justice rooted in the organization's and our peoples' experiences with xenophobia and racism, as well as our community's mobilizations against those forces. We were founded as a cultural anchor in Chinatown by Chinese American activists coming out of the civil rights movement in order to combat inequity by transforming dominant and regressive narratives about our community. Their immediate mission is focused on Chinese diasporic communities, and because of the activist history through which they were founded, they make connections between that immediate root and panethnic Asian American communities and in solidarity with other communities of color. While one third of San Francisco is Asian American, because of funding inequities and culture, there are still relatively few artistic opportunities to tell Chinese community stories; which in turn means there are few narratives that connect Asian American experiences to struggles for justice and the stories of people of color more broadly.

San Francisco LGBT Center

The mission of the SF LGBT Center is to connect the diverse community to opportunities, resources, and each other to achieve the vision of a stronger, healthier, and more equitable world for LGBT people and allies.



RJOY Breakfast Discussion

Restorative Justice for Oakland Youth, RJOY, interrupts cycles of violence and incarceration by promoting RJ practices and policies in schools, communities, and the juvenile justice system. Since 2005, RJOY has been a national thought leader, pioneering race-conscious restorative justice (RJ). During the first 40 years of its existence, the restorative justice movement had no significant racial justice consciousness.

Get Ready! is a prerequisite for young people interested in applying for BrookLynk's paid internships. Internships are 6-10 weeks starting June 20. Community Safety



The Brooklyn Center Police Department and Hennepin County Sheriff's Office have created swap spots - designated public places where residents can exchange items that they have bought and sold online.

You can use these swap spots for all legal meeting exchanges such as exchanging property or child visitation exchanges.

Take these precautions, to prevent those who use online transactions as a means to commit crimes:

- Tell a friend or family member where you are going and when you will return.
- · If possible, have someone accompany you.
- Conduct exchanges during daylight hours, in a public place. If the item(s) have significant value, consider doing the exchange in a Bank parking lot which would also help you to verify the authenticity of the currency.
- Bring a cell phone and make sure it is turned on.
- Trust your instincts. Cancel plans for a transaction if you identify any red flags or have additional concerns for your safety.

Join us for Brooklyn Center's Earth Day tradition! The Shingle Creek Clean Up has been a staple in Brooklyn Center for more than 20 years. On Saturday, April 22, 2023, from 9 am to noon, stop by the Centennial Park Amphitheater at 6301 Shingle Creek Parkway for this family-friendly event. With everyone pitching in, Brooklyn Center can take part in keeping our creeks, lakes, ponds, and rivers clean, improving the water quality in the metro area and the entire Mississippi watershed all the way to the Gulf of Mexico.

We will provide volunteers with grabbers, safety vests, bags, and gloves. However, feel free to bring your own pair of gloves. Dress for the weather as the event continues, rain or shine. If April 22 doesn't work in your schedule, contact Cynthia at 763-585-7100 to arrange for supply pick up on another date.

At the Clean Up event, you will also have the opportunity to learn more about the City's Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program (SWPPP). City staff will provide an overview of the City's program and report on the status of implementing stormwater best management practices. Bins and Barrels Sale

Help yourself, help your wallet and help your earth at the same time.

Purchase a rain barrel and/or a compost bin at a reduced price through the Recycling Association of Minnesota (RAM). Starting in March you can pre-order a bin or barrel on the RAM website recycleminnesota.org/work/ compost-bins-rain-barrels.

Food scraps such as fruit and vegetable peels, stale bread, wilted lettuce, coffee grounds and filters, as well as weeds, faded flowers, and dead plants are among the things you can put into your compost bin. Finished compost can be used as mulch and plant food in your yard. Keeping organic waste out of your garbage reduces your trash volume so you could switch to a smaller garbage cart and save money.

Capture rain in a rain barrel and have a free source of water for your garden. In addition to saving you money, rain barrels can keep moisture away from your foundation and prevent debris from washing into our storm sewers.




The National Wildlife Federation's Monarch Pledge

This program is available to all residents in single-family homes, townhomes, and multiunit buildings up to 8 units that participate in the curbside recycling program. Residential waste only; no contractor or business-related materials.

Spring Curbside Cleanup Coming

Get ready to do some heavy-duty spring cleaning. The Hennepin Recycling Group (HRG) will hold a Bulky Waste Curbside Cleanup in the city at the end of March and the beginning of April.

The city is divided into nine zones (see map) each with its own day of collection. To find your day use the interactive map on the HRG website www.hrgrecycling.com on the Bulky Waste Curbside Cleanup page. A couple of weeks before the Cleanup you'll receive a postcard in the mail that has your date on it.

On the day of collection in your zone trucks will be going down your street to pick up your unwanted items. You will be able to get rid of up to two appliances, two unusable furniture items, two mattresses, and a pile of general junk equivalent to what fits in one level truck bed (generally 4' x 8' x2'). Place the material at the curb and our crews will take it away. Please bag smaller items.

Items not accepted include TVs and computers, tires, railroad ties, paint, hazardous material, and any item more than 100 lbs. More details are on the HRG website. If you're not sure about an item, email BPOM@BrooklynPark. org or call 763-493-8006.

Set your items out before 7 am on collection day, but not more than two days before the pick-up day. There's no need to make an appointment, however, trucks will only go down the street once – no return trips.

Organics Recycling Drop-Off Open

Water Efficiency Rebate Program

To encourage water conservation, the City of Brooklyn Center has received a grant from the Metropolitan Council to establish a rebate program to reduce municipal water use in both residential and commercial properties within the city. The rebate is 75% of the cost of the item, up to a maximum of \$50 for WaterSense toilets, \$100 for Energy Star washing machines, and \$200 for WaterSense irrigation controls, sprinkler heads, and/or rain sensors. Payment will be made upon successful completion of work and submission of payment rebate request form accompanied by original receipts for expenses. Payment is only for equipment costs. Labor charges are not applicable for rebates. Reimbursements will be issued on a first come first served basis until **June 30, 2023**, or until funds are exhausted, whichever comes first. 


Pools
