### What does the home assessment involve?

Qualified staff from SRC or Hennepin County will inspect your entire home, assessing 29 health and safety hazards. Your home also will receive a radon test and, depending on the age of the property, a full lead-based paint inspection. Assessors will look at problems you think you have—but they may also find other problems that could be dangerous to your health.

After the assessment, SRC will move ahead to start making the needed repairs to your home.

## Make your house safe with a Healthy Homes grant





Hennepin County and the Sustainable Resources Center—an authorized community-based nonprofit that provides safety and hazard control services—are partnering to provide a program that can help suburban homeowners fix potential health and safety threats in their homes.

*And the service is free.*

Healthy Homes grants are available to repair your home, including:

- Fixing safety hazards like broken steps
- Removing rodents and insects
- Addressing moisture problems and repairing water damage
- Removing toxic materials

### **What is the Healthy Homes Program?**

Hennepin County and Sustainable Resources Center (SRC) recently received grant funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Office of Healthy Homes and Lead Hazard Control. In the past, Hennepin has used these grants to address lead-based paint hazards in more than 3,000 homes. The current grant expands the use of funding to cover other hazards.

Hennepin County has contracted with SRC to help provide these home repair services.

At least 150 homes will benefit from the new grant.

### **How does the program work?**

You can apply for the program by calling the Sustainable Resources Center at 612-872-3281 or going to their website at [www.src-mn.org](http://www.src-mn.org). Fill out the form and submit to SRC. You should receive a call within a few days to schedule an appointment to inspect your home and determine what repairs need to be done.

*These grants are available only to homes in suburban Hennepin County.* Program participation is subject to prioritization, income guidelines and availability of funds based on needs.
